



Post-Baccalaureate DNP Nurse-Midwifery Program

The Post-Baccalaureate Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) Nurse-Midwifery Program is based at the Rutgers Health Campus in Newark, NJ. This program of study prepares students to be independent providers of full-scope health care across the lifespan including primary care; sexual, reproductive, and gynecologic health care; care during pregnancy, labor and birth, and the postpartum period; and care for the healthy neonate. The nurse-midwifery curriculum provides a combination of theory and practicum experiences. The School of Nursing offers students the opportunity to learn from experienced and nationally recognized faculty who are all actively engaged in teaching and clinical practice.

Role and Qualifications: A doctorally-prepared (DNP) nurse-midwife has a graduate degree in nursing and is prepared to provide midwifery care for diverse individuals, families, and communities and contribute to interprofessional collaboration. The nurse-midwife graduate is distinguished by doctoral preparation that supports both clinical practice and leadership in midwifery. Upon successful completion of the program, graduates will have met Core Competencies as outlined by the American College of Nurse-Midwives and be eligible for the American Midwifery Certification Board (AMCB) midwifery certification examination.

Scope of Practice: As practiced by certified nurse-midwives, midwifery encompasses a full range of primary health care services for women from adolescence beyond menopause. These services include the independent provision of primary care, sexual and reproductive healthcare, including family planning services, preconception care, prenatal care, childbirth and the postpartum period, and care of the normal newborn during the first 28 days of life.

Curriculum: This program is 77 credits with 945 precepted practicum hours and can be completed through a part-time (4 years plan of study). The following are the required courses for this program:
